

# Ealing Reclaim Social Care Action Group Newsletter January 2024

## Update on our latest activities

At the first Ealing Council meeting of the year related to social care (the Health and Well Being Board) questions were asked by Ealing Reclaim Social Care Action Group (ERSCAG) about equipment supplies, increasing debt levels relating to social care charges, and consultations about palliative care provision in the Borough. A very exciting local development is the Council's success in securing funding to tackle health inequalities that will presumably also include a study of social care provision: Ealing Borough Given Funding to Tackle Health Inequality

ERSCAG members also hope to attend the next Health and Care Residents Forum meeting (6<sup>th</sup> February) which will look at community based palliative care and the future of co-production efforts on behalf of people who are older, have disabilities or long-term conditions.

## Campaigns - current or upcoming

The start of the year seems to have kicked off numerous local and national campaigns - for example, Change.org has two petitions — one (<u>link</u>) challenges the government's decision to discontinue the Disability Cost of Living Payment citing the fact that disabled people are twice as likely to live in poverty compared to non-disabled people. A separate petition calls for the Minister of State for Disabled People to be made a permanent position. According to Scope, there are 13.9m disabled people in the UK, yet "despite these numbers, we find ourselves without representation at ministerial level."

There are also two very important (virtual) meetings being organised in the near future:

- End Social Care Disgrace are organising a national public meeting (virtual) -\_END THE EXPLOITATION OF MIGRANT CARE WORKERS on Monday 5<sup>th</sup> February 6:30 8:00pm to explore how care and support workers from overseas are financially exploited, harassed, intimidated and now threatened with separation from their families (see some of the media coverage of this topic in the 'staffing' segment later). <u>People's NHS.</u> Care Rights UK (previously Residents and Relatives Association) reports: that "after three years of relentless lobbying by campaigners" the government has introduced legislation to bolster visiting access to care homes and hospitals, but they want the authorities to go further "Never again - why we need the Care Supporters Bill". Disability Rights UK have asked people to sign their petition Tell Rishi Sunak: respond to the UN inquiry on disabled people's rights! A United Nations report in 2016 found grave and systemic rights violations committed against disabled people in the UK, but new evidence shows that 2023 was worse than ever given the impact of austerity policies when "more than HALF of adults with disabilities said they struggle to pay their energy bills".

At the same time, the Department of Health and Social Care (in an Adult Social Care update in January) reports that government "has unveiled measures to reaffirm care work as a career, helping to recruit and retain talent by providing accredited qualifications, training and funded apprenticeships. For the first time, there will be a national care career structure (the <u>Care Workforce Pathway</u>), with defined roles and professional development. An accredited qualification (the <u>Care Certificate</u>) will be introduced to help recognise the work of 37,000 workers. Lastly, funding will be provided for apprenticeship places and digital training to embrace new technology."

Your Help Needed:

## Sources of advice and help

Ealing Council is intending to extend its Direct Payment provision in coming months — in line with its commitment to listening to the voice of the user, and to the principle of co-production - and ERSCAG awaits final decisions. One crucial element, if Direct Payments are to deliver genuine advances, is the importance of supporting Direct Payment Users. In that context, we note interesting workshops being offered on this topic by Bringing Us Together — "Starting on the Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> January we will be running a short course of three workshops for individual employers and those receiving Direct Payments. These workshops are FREE as they are fully funded by Skills for Care and will be recorded for those who are interested and are not able to make the live workshops." In a measure to address the issue of digital exclusion which disproportionately affects older and disabled people, as well as those on low incomes, Ealing Council has a programme of recycling computers -

More generally, in terms of advice and support – and if you are not getting satisfactory answers to any complaints or concerns that are worrying you - you might want to approach your local ward Councillor, your MP, and/or your Assembly Member. In serious situations, you may need to complain to the Local Government & Social Care Ombudsman (www.lgo.org.uk). For recent complaints upheld against Ealing Council see their bulletin (4<sup>th</sup> January) at London Borough of Ealing (23 003 422) — which was reported in the local press and was summarised by the Ombudsman as follows: "Mr B complained the Council proposed increasing his father's care contributions and it repeatedly failed to respond to his correspondence when he asked for clarification about the costs. He also says the Council has failed to resolve the issue of the additional costs for his father's incontinence pull up pads. The Council was at fault for its delays in responding to Mr B's correspondence and its complaints handling. It also delayed dealing with the issue of the incontinence pull up pads. The Council has agreed to our recommendations to address the injustice caused by fault."

## Social care over the longer term

A report out this month from The Health Foundation sets out a vision - Social care funding reform in England - The Health Foundation — arguing that "meaningful social care reform will require additional government spending. But, if it chooses to, the next government can afford to provide better, fairer, and more generous support to older and disabled people" (our emphasis). There are important elections in May (Mayoral and London Assembly) and a general election later in the year. Campaigners need to make the economic arguments (see useful resources in - Carenomics Report - Future Social Care Coalition and the Women's Budget Group's argument about why tax cuts would be bad news for women.

But we also need to push social care further up the political agenda - why is it that our politicians often say that they do not hear about social care when they are out canvassing? Given the large number of people who are in receipt of social care, or care-workers, or carers, ERSCAG believes that this is an issue of great concern to many voters but it is largely an 'invisible' issue to many of our elected officials. Several polls are worth recounting to any politicians looking for your votes over the next few months! ERSCAG will work with colleagues in End Social Care Disgrace to meet with different political parties — one meeting is already being planned with the Liberal Democrats' policy team, thanks to assistance from Ealing Councillor Athena Zissimos. Maybe you, or a group you are involved with, will be meeting with candidates — please consider asking them about their vision for social care. We will use this newsletter over the next few months to report on what other groups are planning. For example, London Citizens are organising an event on 25<sup>th</sup> April to meet with leading mayoral candidates. The Labour Social Work Group is currently evolving its manifesto, and we assume many other groups will be doing something similar.
