## Update on our latest activities

Supporters of Ealing Reclaim Social Care Action Group (ERSCAG) engaged actively in the General Election with canvassers, hustings, and media coverage to ensure that social care got attention. There was a feeling that this oft over-looked aspect of policy got more attention than usual in the national debate, and it figured in all the political manifestos. Our challenge now is to keep it centre-stage and insist that the promises made are implemented, and indeed that more imagination be committed to bringing about real change nationally and locally. Locally, three Labour MPs were elected to represent the Borough of Ealing – two were re-elected (Rupa Huq and James Murray) and a third, Deirdre Costigan, is new to parliament. ERSCAG will be maintaining all these links. Ealing Council Cabinet portfolios have also changed (Ealing Council Cabinet Reshuffle Following General Election) and Cllr Polly Knewstub has taken on responsibility for Adult Social Care. ERSCAG has already had an excellent face-to-face meeting with her and hopes to hold regular meetings in future.

An early discussion with Cllr Knewstub – to be followed up at Council committee meetings due in September – concerned Council's commitment to listen to the voice of residents. There are some good signs - bodies such as the Ealing Health and Care Residents Forum, the introduction of 'Co-Production Boards'; and a commitment to transparency by way of Freedom of Information requests more (https://www.ealingtoday.co.uk/default.asp?section=community&spage=common/eac ouncil260.htm). Moreover, the Local Government Association has some useful guidance about effective consultation and engagement with local residents: https://www.local.gov.uk/our-support/communications-and-communityengagement/resident-communications/understanding-views-2. However. regular readers will be aware of grave concerns around the recent closure of Ealing Careline without any such engagement with users of the service: so, watch this space!

## Campaigns – current or upcoming national campaigns

The summer period saw events to mark Learning Disability Week - in Ealing - <u>Seen</u>, <u>heard</u>, <u>and valued</u>; and there was also a Big Issue Special (Issue 1620, 17-23 June). Deaf Blind Awareness Week was marked (24-30 June) but was there much publicity?

Silver Voices (a campaign group for older people – <u>www.silvervoices.co.uk</u>) called (25 July) for a "time-limited" cross-party commission <u>https://www.express.co.uk/news/politics/1928095/Social-Care-NHS-Labour-</u> <u>Conservatives-Lib-Dems</u>) - "With Labour's overwhelming majority, there is a window of opportunity for cross-party talks to produce legislative proposals to reform and fund social care for the benefit of future generations .....all parties surely agree that affordable social care should be provided so that all older and disabled people can live with maximum independence in their own homes for as long as possible, to relieve pressure on the NHS. Now is the time for politicians to come together to meet this challenge". A spokesman for the Department for Health and Social Care said: "We know that people are suffering without the care they need, and we are committed to ensuring everyone lives an independent, dignified life. "We are going to grip the social care crisis, starting with the workforce by delivering a new deal for care workers. We will also take steps to create a National Care Service underpinned by national standards, delivering consistency of care across the country."

The August bulletin of the British Institute for Human Rights (www.bihr.org.uk) reports that they are working with Just Fair (www.justfair.org.uk) to offer free tailored support to local groups facing discrimination and disadvantage so that they can use human rights law in their everyday work. Local Ealing based group, the Southhall Community Alliance (SCA) will be working with BIHR and Just Fair to develop a human rights based approach "to address the social, cultural, religious and local needs of the area in order to make Southall a good and satisfying area in which to live and work".

face. AccessAva uses technology to guide you through a set of questions designed to get you the right information for you. # Social care over the longer term

So, we have a new government – will anything change? All the major political parties included social care fairly prominently in their manifestos (see May and June ERSCAG newsletters).

The first opportunity to find out to what extent these commitments will be carried through now that the elections are over will be at the range of party-political conferences now due: Greens (6-8 September in Manchester); Liberal Democrats (14-17 September in Brighton); Labour (22-25 September in Liverpool); and Conservatives (29 September-2 October in Birmingham). If you are active in any of these parties, or have friends who are, encourage them to ask questions about the party's intentions regarding social care. The Opposition parties in particular should be encouraged to demand accountability from the new government – by agreeing to routinely ask PQs about progress, putting forward members to the Health and Social Care Select Committee, and any All-Party Parliamentary Group looking at social care. The manifestos suggested that there was a fair degree of unanimity about the crisis in social care and even a fair degree of agreement about what needs to be done – so now we need to see action.

Moreover, ERSCAG and others have argued that it makes economic (as well as moral and social sense) to invest in social care. For further arguments about the popularity of this agenda, see Prof John Curtice (polling guru!) talking on Newsnight (<u>shows</u>) on the eve of the election about the very high level of popular support for good public services rather than tax cuts!
